Not so much as a laundromat business. I never had a clue that will be in the laundromat business. I know that when I was working for the University of Memphis, I was a housekeeper/lead custodian. And that always pay close attention to my laundry rooms. So when he came before me as it did then I knew it was something God was bringing into fruition and I know that I'm appointed to be here.

No and yes. The businesses already up and running my cousin already a clientele when I got here so that was good. And she didn't take out a loan. Not that I know of.

My cousin has always been a business lady. She just saved. She knew how to save. Her and her family would to get together and do certain things. You know the other part the family will get together, the ones that had the ability and they would buy houses, remodel them, sell them and save the money from that. As far as I know she's always been the business lady. She's very careful with how she spends her money. She makes its count. She also teaches us how to make it count. When I came into the business, I did know anything about being a businessperson, but

she took time out and talk to me walked me through things and told me, "Barbara you have to do it like this. I've been successful here and you can be successful, but you've got to do it like this thus and so."

It's not. Not necessary at all. I mean, I was blessed that my cousin of the business before me but I'm really positive that I could have done it now that I stepped into it. She has an identical twin sister and it was very hard for them coming up. When they did get a chance to go to school, they went. So when she got older, I don't know of who was in her thirties or forties, but she did she went back to school. In fact she walked up and down the street, she told me, to get to school at night. She went to night school together GED.

How difficult is it to run your business? Explain, please.

Some of the challenges would be the traffic. The young people they come out and the like to hang out in front of your business. Where my aunt had older customers and I've lost some of the older customers because of the young people wanting to hang out. And you don't want around the mall for the showing them love. So I'm in the midst of trying to show them love and run my business. Because I don't want them to feel like I'm just here to make a dollar, and I do need to make a dollar because I do need to pay my bills, but I want them to know that I'm here because I care about you, too. But I need you to be respectful. So I want to help them learn respect for others. If I can show them that they don't have to just stand around. I'd tell them about Advance Memphis that program that can help you. A lot of them say," Well, I got felonies and nobody gonna hire me" and this and that. When the real problem is you smoke weed out here, you're doing drugs, and you're going to get a drug test if you're going to get a job. You won't sit down and let the people who are trying to help you help you fill out an application properly. A lot of them don't know how to fill out an application and read because I've seen it in here. But they don't want to sit down and do it. So hopefully mopey is that that challenge will get better as I stay here because I plan on staying in this spot. You want hope for them, but you also want them to have hole for themselves. You cannot give up on anyone.

5. What advice would you give my 11th grade students looking to be entrepreneurs?

• Is college necessary to be a successful entrepreneur? Explain, please.

I'm kind of stuck with that question since I didn't go to college. I wish I had gone to college. I can see a lot of benefit and go to college. I would have more information.
